Speaker: Niraj Antani State Representative

Niraj replaces the seat of our dear friend late Terry Blair. He began his talk with praise he heard from voters and again amongst fellow House and State Representatives. He joked that he's just trying to be half the man Terry Blair was.

Then he talked briefly about how the governor house and senate came to terms on the budget the spring. After much negotiation the result was a 6.3% tax cut. No tax increase, 75% tax cut on small business first \$250,000 of revenue and 3% flat tax after that

Next he discussed the three major ballot issues you'll see in November

#1 is a redistricting of state legislature
Issues #2 and #3 both have to deal with marijuana

A yes vote on issue two really makes issue three null and void. This Issue makes it illegal to have a monopoly or cartel

Issue three is the legalization of marijuana but only to be controlled by 10 investors on 10 plots of land. They will control all of the growing and distribution. It will be 1100 retail outlets for sale of marijuana. 1100 is greater than the number of all Ohio Starbucks McDonald's and liquor stores combined. If issue three passes there Will certainly be an increase in Bureau of Worker's Compensation rates. Niraj supports a **no** vote here
